Introduction

The below report is provided to demonstrate the activities and impact of the <u>Societal Impact of Pain (SIP)</u> <u>platform</u>. While the impact of advocacy is often difficult to quantify, due to the long-term nature of relationship building and the policy process, this report can go some way to demonstrating real impact. The report shows key activities, a written qualitative analysis, as well as some key performance metrics.

Impact of the Societal Impact of Pain (SIP) Platform on Pain Policy?

In late 2021, the Societal Impact of Pain (SIP) Platform set bi-annual policy priorities and objectives for 2022







and 2023. Therefore, in the last two years, SIP has grown substantially, with the systematic involvement of scientific expert-review in the development and launch of SIP Position Papers; the development of multistakeholder policy events; continued collaboration with the European Union Agency for Safety and Health at Work (EU-OSHA); as well as the strengthening and growth of the SIP Stakeholder Forum and the SIP National Platforms, placing both at the centre of driving the policy activities and direction of SIP annually. All without losing sight of key health EU policy priorities and initiatives relevant to SIP core objectives.

Additionally, SIP has continued to expand and nurture existing, as well as new relationships with European policymakers and institutions, and the SIP Stakeholder Forum and network of sibling organisations, by doing in-person meetings and events at the European Parliament.

SIP has strengthen and grown substantially its online presence, showcasing all SIP activities and events through its different communications channels, such as <u>Facebook</u>, <u>Twitter</u>, and <u>LinkedIn</u>. Further, SIP has also launched a new, more user-friendly <u>website</u>. The quarterly SIP <u>Newsletter</u> continues to be a great success in terms of opening rates, and so it is SIP's participation in different advocacy and awareness <u>campaigns</u>.

Following the <u>SIP Road Map Monitor Report</u>, a thorough analysis on the status of different European countries on National Health Frameworks of Pain, Pain as a Quality Indicator, Pain Research, Pain in Employment and Pain Education, and the ICD-11 related event in late 2022 entitled 'Pain in the International Classification of diseases: <u>A SIP Event'</u>, where experts in the field discussed ICD-11 from different points of view, SIP met, at the beginning of 2023, with the ENVI European Health Data Space (EHDS) Rapporteur MEP Sokol and his office, to ensure the File addressed the needs of the pain community. More specifically, SIP successfully included in the European Health Data Space (EHDS) Draft Report, a reference to the International Classification of Diseases (ICD-11). Additionally, SIP also successfully included several Amendments on the same topic, some of which, have already passed the Compromise Amendments process. The vote on the ENVI and LIBE Committees will take place on 25th October 2023 and the Plenary vote on 20th November 2023. SIP remains confident that the Amendments will make it to the final vote.

On the other hand, in 2023, SIP also focused on Pain and Mental Health, targeting the <u>European Mental</u> <u>Health Strategy</u> (providing a response to the Roadmap and Consultation launched by the European Commission) and, ahead of its launch, SIP published a <u>Joint Statement on Pain and Mental</u> on the close link between both matters, in collaboration with ten different organisations, working in the field of pain, painrelated or mental health policies. The nine Recommendations in such document, call upon EU and national policy makers to ensure a range of aspects related to pain and mental health are acknowledged in health policy. Further, and ahead of the launch of the Mental Health Report, by the newly created health subcommittee of the European Parliament, SANT (non-legislative), SIP reached out to fourteen different Members of the European Parliament (MEPs), to ensure the nine key Recommendations were taken into consideration during the drafting process. More importantly, both the Rapporteur and the Shadow Rapporteur, who reached out to SIP directly, confirmed the Recommendations would be taken into consideration. Once the <u>SANT Draft Report on Mental Health</u> was published, SIP did a second round of engagements and sent Amendments to all those MEPs that had received and confirmed the first round. As a result, SIP managed to successfully include twenty-four Amendments. The Amendments documents can be found <u>here</u>.

To continue the activities on pain and mental health, SIP organised an <u>in-person event</u> at the European

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Parliament, on World Mental Health Day, 10th October, to politically launch the SIP Joint Statement on Pain and Mental Health. The event was hosted by MEP Vind (S&D) and MEP Sokol (EPP). However, MEP Montserrat (EPP), and MEP Saliba (S&D) were also at the event and part of the roster of speakers. Additionally, representatives from the European Psychiatric Association, the European Federation of Neurological Associations, the Europe Region World Physiotherapy, the European Cancer Organisation, the Global Alliance of Mental Health Illness Advocacy Networks, along with experts in the field from all over Europe, explored the close relationship between pain and mental health, the quality of and access to safe pain management, the link between pain, mental health and employment, and how can all be integrated into mental health policies. The Report below, clearly outlines what the event focused on.

Additionally, SIP, via EFIC being a member, continues to be involved in two EU4Health projects lead by the European Cancer Organisation (ECO): INTERACT-EUROPE (Inter-speciality training programme) and SMART-CARE (cancer survivors electronic smart card), both are well underway. Moreover, SIP is part of the European Commission Beating Cancer Plan Stakeholder Group in the EU Policy Platform. Further, SIP continues to be part of the thematic group 'Quality of Life' of the Stakeholder Contact Group on Europe's Beating Cancer Plan, where input is provided to the Commission on the implementation of Europe's Beating Cancer Plan and the Horizon Europe Cancer Mission, in areas under the remit of the thematic group.

SIP's efforts in workplace integration and adaptation policy lead to the public recognition of our activities as 'best-practices' from EU-OSHA, and close collaboration with the Agency, and the participation of SIP in a parallel session at the November 2022 <u>EU-OSHA Summit</u> in Bilbao. Furthermore, SIP has now renewed its partnership with the Agency and will be a collaborator in their 2023-2025 campaign focused on safe and healthy work in the digital age.

As a result of the SIP National Platform meetings, the 2023 SIP Stakeholder Forum meeting, SIP will be continue to focus in 2024 on Pain and Digital Health, ICD-11, Pain and Mental Health and Access to Treatment. However, given that in 2024 European Elections will take place, SIP will monitor the upcoming EU Agenda to remain active on other policy of interest to the pain community.

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	The European Parliament EHDS Report was approved by the ENVI and LIBE Committees on November 2023, and ratified in the Plenary on 11 th December 2023, and two ICD references passed, one in Article 5 and a second one in Annex 1. The Trialogues will start on 14 th December 2023.
SIP Pain and Mental Health Joint Statement: COMPLETED	Ahead of the European Commission launch of the European Mental Health Strategy and under the umbrella of the Societal Impact of Pain (SIP) Platform, a gathering of ten European professional and patient organisations have developed a Joint Statement on the close link between pain and mental health. The nine recommendations call upon EU and national policy makers to ensure a range of aspects related to pain and mental health are acknowledged in health policy.
Fostering and enhancing Mental Health policies in the EU via European Parliament Report: COMPLETED	SIP has worked with MEPs to place pain and chronic pain at the centre of mental health policies. This has been done via the European Parliament SANT Sub-Committee Report on Mental Health, where pain, chronic pain, the co-occurrence of chronic and mental health conditions, amongst others, where included within the file. The European Parliament ENVI Committee approved the file in November 2023, and ratified in the Plenary on 11 th December 2023. This inclusion, not only places pain on the Health Policy Agenda, but it's also a significant milestone for the pain community, placing adequate, multidisciplinary pain treatment at the centre of mental health conditions.
